**1925**  
Eagle Farm Aerodrome was officially opened by the Commonwealth Government on 36 hectares of agricultural land.

**1926**  
Qantas began its Brisbane service.

**1941**  
During WWII, the Eagle Farm Aerodrome was part of a network of airports and airfields rapidly built or upgraded to defend Australia and support operations in The Pacific and Asia. The United States military upgraded our grass airfields to three hard-surface runways.

**1928**  
Sir Charles Kingsford Smith landed the first trans-Pacific flight from California to Brisbane in the Southern Cross aircraft.

**1946**  
Eagle Farm resumed civil operations after WWII.

**1960s**  
2,700 hectares of land was set aside 5 kilometres north towards Moreton Bay for future expansion.

**1975**  
A temporary International Terminal opened at Eagle Farm featuring a visual expression of a passenger's journey in its interior design, including a cloud motif for the departure lounge, inviting passengers to "take to the sky". This artwork was created by local architect Don Watson.

**1971**  
Current Brisbane Airport site secured with a master plan for a parallel runway system.

**1980**  
Development begins on the building of a new Brisbane Airport. 14 million cubic metres of sand was used to stabilise the swampy land for the new air traffic control tower, terminal, aprons, taxiways and runways.

**1988**  
In March 1988 at 2.45pm the last departure from Eagle Farm took off on Runway 4. It was a special charity charter Ansett Boeing 767-277 VH-RME. The flight returned to the new Brisbane Airport landing on Runway 19L.  
The new airport opened just in time to welcome the world to Brisbane for Expo 88.

**2000s**  
BNE gains momentum with a raft of airlines and routes added to the network including Virgin Australia (2000), China Airlines (2003), Emirates (2003), Jetstar (2004), Etihad (2007) and China Southern (2010).

**1995**  
The new International Terminal opened to serve increased international travel demand.

**2007**  
Brisbane's New Runway construction project is approved by the Federal Government. A parallel runway system, in which both runways can operate simultaneously, was part of long-term planning for Brisbane Airport since 1971.

**2008**  
The International Terminal expansion was completed including an additional 33,000 square metres of space across all four floors of the Terminal with better airline processing, retail, customs, security and baggage areas.

**2012**  
Site preparation and reclamation works started on Brisbane's New Runway site in July 2012 and continued for five years to stabilise the ground for construction due to extremely poor strength soils and swamp in the area.

**2014**  
The G20 was one of the most important logistical events in Brisbane Airport's history with the arrival and departure of more than 70 State and support aircraft.

**2017**  
Construction started on Brisbane's New Runway including the airfield, Dryandra Road underpass, runway and lighting.

**2020**  
Brisbane's New Runway opened on 12 July.

**2022 - 2024**  
Our network into the United States grew with United Airlines connecting San Francisco (October, 2022), American Airlines flying to Dallas-Fort Worth (October, 2024) and Delta Air Lines launching flights to Los Angeles (December, 2024).

**2023**  
Brisbane Airport embarks on its biggest transformation ever, a \$5 billion+ investment over the next decade and includes over 150 projects starting with security upgrades at both Terminals.

**2025**  
100 years of Brisbane Airport!

By the end of 2025, both the Domestic and International Terminals will have security upgrades completed, with other renovations continuing into 2026.
